Snow, Blowing Snow, Wind Gusts, Wind Chills

Accumulating fluffy snow Wed, followed by strong winds, blowing snow, and deadly chills Thu - Sat


Key Messages:

- ◆ Winter Storm Warning for 5-8 inches of snow on Wednesday, ending early Thursday.
- ◆ A 'break' of around 12-18 hours beginning late Wednesday through Thursday afternoon with limited new snow before winds increase.
- ◆ The light and fluffy snow will blow around significantly once winds increase on Thursday.
- ◆ Blizzard conditions late Thursday through early Saturday due to blowing snow.
- ◆ Frigid wind chills between -25° to -40°F or colder are expected Thursday through Friday night.

Travel conditions could become life threatening Thursday through Friday night due to the combination of extreme cold and blizzard conditions.

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
Key Messages:

- ◆ Blizzard Warnings and Wind Chill Warnings for western and southern Minnesota where the strongest winds will also bring the lowest wind chills.
- Winter Storm Watch northeast of the Blizzard Warning will be upgraded with more confidence either tonight or tomorrow.
- Conditions worsen the second half of Thursday, remaining extremely dangerous through midday Saturday.

Travel conditions could become life threatening Thursday through Friday night due to the combination of extreme cold and blizzard conditions.






Timeline - Western Minnesota

Key Messages


- Snow begins early Wednesday morning and tapers off early Thursday.
- Winds increase Wednesday night leading to blowing and drifting of the fresh snow and possible blizzard conditions lasting into Saturday.
- Wind chill values fall as low as 40 below zero Thursday through Friday night.
- Travel will become difficult to impossible with whiteout conditions at times.






Timeline - Central Minnesota

Key Messages

- Snow begins Wednesday morning and tapers off on Thursday.
- Several hours of gusts near 50 mph possible.
- Blowing and drifting snow will lead to very low visibilities, and travel will become difficult to impossible Thursday and Friday.
- Travel will become difficult to impossible due to whiteout conditions at times.







Timeline - Eastern Minnesota

Key Messages

- Snow begins Wednesday morning and tapers off on Thursday.
- Northern MN is at greater risk for power outages due to heavy snow on trees from last week's storm.
- Several hours of gusts reaching 40-50 mph possible.
- Travel will become difficult to impossible due to whiteout conditions at times.











Timeline - Western Wisconsin

Key Messages

- Elevated risk for power outages due to heavy snow on trees from last week's storm.
- Several hours of gusts reaching 40-50 mph possible.
- Travel will become difficult to impossible with whiteout conditions at times.










Potential for 4" or more

Tonight through Thursday Evening

Forecast Details

- → At least 4 inches of snow is likely (greater than 50%) across the entire forecast area.
- → Compared to the last update, the best chance for heavier snow shift farther north into central Minnesota, and farther east into western Wisconsin.








Potential for 6" or more

Tonight through Thursday Evening

Forecast Details

- → Potential for 6 inches fairly widespread across the region, with lesser amounts to the west.
- → Compared to the prior forecast, the potential for more snow shifted eastwards into western Wisconsin.






Potential for 8" or more

Tonight through Thursday Evening

Forecast Details

→ At least 8 inches of snow likely (greater than 50%) across much of north central and western Wisconsin.






Potential for 12" or more

Tonight through Thursday Evening

Forecast Details

→ At least 12 inches of snow possible (20%) across much of west central Wisconsin.






Gusty Winds

Thursday 6AM through Saturday 12PM

Key Messages

- The strongest winds will be across western and southern Minnesota, however gusty winds resulting in significant blowing snow will be present everywhere.
- Sustained winds will be out of the northwest for the entire event at 25-30mph.
- Significant travel impacts are LIKELY across the area due to blowing and drifting snow, in addition to visibility impaired by the blowing snow.
- Power outages are possible in areas that still have snow on trees, as falling limbs have the potential to knock down power lines.








Dangerous Wind Chills

Widespread Dangerous Wind Chills From Thursday to Saturday

Key Messages

- The combination of low temperatures in the teens below zero and wind gusts up to 50mph will create extremely dangerous wind chill conditions beginning Thursday and continuing through Saturday.
- The risk for travelers is especially high, with blowing snow and blizzard conditions making rescue efforts extremely difficult. Becoming stranded from Thursday through Saturday will have life-threatening implications not only for the motorists, but for anyone involved in rescue or recovery operations.
- Having an emergency kit which includes food, water, blankets, and other necessities could be life saving if travel is absolutely necessary.




Pattern Shift by Year's End

Temperature Outlook valid Dec 27 - Jan 2

What/Where/When

- → Warmer than normal conditions look to arrive near the end of the year.
- → The pattern which brought significant snow and cold has been pushed out by this new pattern, which has the potential to persist through the middle of January.
- → Precipitation is trending above normal as well, however only slightly such that near or below normal precipitation is still possible.








Safety and Preparedness

Key Messages

- → 5-8 inches of widespread fluffy snow will impact travel on Wednesday.
- → Blowing snow and blizzard conditions will combine with dangerous wind chills Thursday through Saturday to severely impact travel.
